

Trumps Update

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Counting the key

Today's deal is submitted by leading player Ted Bourke, of Canberra. Your left hand opponent, West, is vulnerable and opens a weak 2♥ and your partner, North, overcalls 2♠. East passes and you must decide what to do with this hand:

SOUTH

▲ J 7 2♥ K 8 5

📥 AK7

With 20 HCP and a reasonable fit for spades, you bid 4NT (which you play with this partner as ordinary Blackwood, not Keycard), and North answers 5 to show one ace. What should you call next?

A danger if you bid 6♠ is that East will be on lead and will start with a heart through your king, and it will be no surprise to find that the heart bidder, West, is sitting over you with the A-Q of hearts. To protect your ♥K, you decide to bid 6NT. This has been the auction:

The +J is led.

Dealer West, EW vul. Contract: 6NT by South.



How should you plan the play in 6NT?

Barring a 5-0 break, there will be five tricks in spades, and you have six top tricks in the minors, a total of 11 tricks. A heart lead would have provided the twelfth but West was not so kind – the diamond lead has given you nothing.

You focus on the three main chances for a twelfth trick.

Firstly, if the ♥A is with East, a finesse to the ♥K would work. However this seems unlikely given West's 2H opening, and given that you are in notrumps you cannot safely play the suit to test the layout.

Secondly, diamonds may be 3-3 in which case the fourth round of diamonds will come good.


Thirdly, the clubs may behave (splitting 3-3, or a short jack). That is not the only possibility in the suit – a finesse is also possible, if you knew who had the jack.

You could cash the spades, diamonds and clubs but this time neither minor breaks so you will be defeated if you take this line.

You already know that West has six hearts for the vulnerable weak two opening, and if you can find out more about the distribution it may help you decide how to play the clubs. Accordingly, start by cashing the three diamond winners. East shows out on the third round, meaning that West started with four diamonds, as well as the six-card heart suit. It can't hurt to cash the A (or K) so do that too, finding that both opponents follow. Next, play the \bigstar J then another spade over to dummy, and again both opponents follow. What have we discovered about the hand?


West has followed to two rounds of spades, has shown six hearts with the weak two, is known to have started with four diamonds since East had only a doubleton, and has followed suit to one round of clubs. Thus West's shape was 2-6-4-1.

Given that West has no more clubs, you confidently lead the ♣10 from dummy for a finesse. Sure enough, it wins, so you are then able to cash the ♣K, then cross back to dummy with a spade to take the remaining black suit winners. This was the complete hand:

You are East with the hand shown. Choose a call then compare with the experts. On our panel, Derrick Browne and leading world bridge authorities Barry Rigal and Ron Klinger are joined by Nick Fahrer from The Bridge Shop, world number one BBO bidding forum winner and 2024 Australian Bridge bidding forum reader top scorer Alexander Cook, and NSW reps Nick Hughes and Nicoleta Giura.



This hand has 8 theoretical losers (2 spades, 1 heart, 3 diamonds and 2 clubs), so is about 1 trick worse than an opening hand. Unless partner has some extras, 8 losers opposite an opening hand makes an average of 9 tricks when a fit exists. And the panel has come to the same conclusion.

Browne: $3\clubsuit$, showing a fit and moderate strength. Seems about right. There is no reason to assume that anyone can make game, so I am not going to bounce to $4\clubsuit$.

Cook: 3♥. This is a cue raise showing a good raise (limit raise or more) in spades. This is a little too strong for a competitive 3♠. If partner bids 3♠ I will pass.

Fahrer: 3♥ - cue bidding their suit - a good raise to 3♠ or better.

Giura: $3 \forall$ – to stop in $3 \bigstar$ if minimum opening.

Klinger: 3, sound raise to 3, for most pairs, I expect. In our methods we play X = 6-9 pts, exactly 3 spades, 2NT 10+ with exactly 3 spades, 3 = 10+ with 4+ spades, 3 = 6-9 with 4+ spades.


Hughes: 3♥. Limit spade raise, though maybe 3♠ is enough, plus might silence West.

Rigal: 3♥. Limit raise with three trumps, but I do think it's a slight overbid. Those pesky opponents!

4 can go down, but it requires an initial trump lead to create that chance for the defence legitimately, because two rounds of trumps destroys dummy's ability to ruff more than once.

On a non-trump lead, declarer can in theory make 4♠, but will have to play very well. At the end, declarer plays all their trumps. South is squeezed in clubs & hearts, having to discard from ♥QT,♣J5. A club gives declarer 4 clubs tricks, but baring the ♥Q allows declarer to let South win with that card, only to lead away from ♣J5, declarer holding ♣Q8 and dummy ♣107. But 4♥ for the opponents makes:

In 4, declarer can ruff a spade, play ace then queen of hearts and lead any diamond from the table. When the king pops, declarer can either continue with a high diamond or ruff a low one, either way the defence just gets their trump jack as their third trick.


